## A Successful Year for OEC!

The Onondaga Earth Corps has concluded another year of service to the community, and as we reflect on the past several seasons, we can see that 2019 has proven to be a year of great successes and advancements for our organization.

Over the past year, OEC has employed over 40 youth and young adults and connected with countless more through our outreach and volunteer efforts. We have brought approximately 600 volunteers to our community events, which included street clean-up efforts and tree-planting events held throughout Onondaga County.

We have planted over 615 trees throughout the city and county, thanks to the efforts of our tree-planting crews as well as that of volunteers at our community events at Onondaga Park and Pratts Falls. Our Green Infrastructure crew has maintained over 20 green spaces in Syracuse, and we have educated over 450 community members.

One of our biggest accomplishments has been increasing our media footprint. We have expanded our efforts to receive more media coverage for the work we do, and to ultimately allow OEC to become a more well-known entity in the community. These efforts have proven greatly successful, with many events receiving coverage from local news sources.

#### **TAVEON STENSON - CREW LEADER**

"The outcome of the Pratts Falls planting was very gratifying for me. While it wasn't my first time helping to plan an event here at OEC. It was the first event where I was in charge of preparing my crew for a bigger leadership role. Which means a lot to me as a leader/supervisor myself. To see my crew members show up & show out in their positions for the event was beyond amazing! Observing the growth & tremendous effort that they put into it was awesome. They truly made me proud, it was hard work but everyone, including the volunteers made it a day to remember."

#### **SHANE FULLER - CREW MEMBER**

"I had the pleasure of being apart of the planning process for our last community tree planting out at Pratt's Falls. I took on the job of writing the day's agenda & assigning people to their groups, I learned all that it really takes to make an event like that happen. The day of the event I helped unload the tree delivery and helped with registering people. The turn out for the planting was good, even though we had a set back we got all of the trees in the ground."

"Honestly, this season was very appealing. It made me more aware of the progress that I have made this fall, and the growth ahead of me. I've received heavy equipment training using a backhoe and a dingo. I have a satisfying remembrance of taking before and after pictures when we plant or prune trees in the community. It's quite gratifying to see my efforts & hard work are paying off. I've recently received an achievement award (presented by New York State Senator Rachel May) at our Earth Corps Encore Fundraising Event. This fall was my first time transplanting on a G.I crew. By transplanting plants, we are spreading life in areas that need help prospering, due to distinct underlying environmental problems."

## G.I. Team Helps Clean up City Parks

Most of our green infrastructure crew's work consists of weeding, edging, trash removal, and general maintenance at our G.I. sites throughout the year. In 2019 we had a dynamic crew structure which allowed every crew member to learn about and participate in maintaining over 20 rain gardens, bioswales, and vacant lots around the City of Syracuse. We also had the opportunity to educate over 100 kids/adults from schools, and communities about the green infrastructure practices, and how it helps reducing water/air pollution, and environmental issues.

The beginning of this G.I. season consisted of environmental education by Amy Samuels from the Onondaga Environmental Institute on how rain gardens are constructed, about water/sewer sheds, water cycles, combined sewer systems, and water treatment. Crew members learned about native plants and what traits each plant in a particular garden and how those characteristics work to maintain the functionality of the rain gardens, as well as invasive plant species (weeds) and how they hinder the desirable condition of any given site and why they need to be removed.

As we moved along in the season crews learned how to test soil conditions at a site to determine the composition, quality, and drainage properties. Crews also learned how to logistically plan where plants should be placed in a garden to promote beauty, color (something blooming throughout every season), and healthy growth while preventing erosion and bare spots.
