AYA Crew Takes on the Adirondacks

The Advanced Young Adult Crew spent three weeks in Old Forge in the Adirondacks on a National Grid Tree Assessment Project with Nelson Tree Company. We shadowed three different trained OPCs (one person crews) over 20 miles of power lines (on & off-road) daily. We learned how to properly assess and mark trees that pose a hazard to the power lines. During our training, we learned how to use iPad based software that kept track of the 600+ marked trees on this project. Between the months of September and October, we will be returning to the Adirondacks to shadow tree crews scheduled to cut the trees we marked this summer.

Here's what the crew members had to say about the project:

Shane Fuller: "My experience in Old Forge took me out of my comfort zone having me be away from home. At the same time this was a great opportunity for me to learn skills that most people don't get a chance to go and do. I learned how to identify the native Adirondack trees and how to identify if they will or are hazardous to the service wires. I learned a lot about the different people we worked with and how they ended up in the field they are in now. After this experience I have gained valuable skills that will help me in the future."

Victor Reeder: "My experience in Old Forge has brought out a significant amount of perspectives towards my life. Honestly, I love getting trained on new things that I haven't learned yet on how to do. I respect the quote teach a man how to fish and he can eat for a lifetime. I was out there in a totally different atmosphere away from home."

Schiller Park Clean-up

One of the many projects that OEC youth crews participated in this summer was an invasive species removal project in Schiller Park. Crews cleared buckthorn from approximately 25,000 square feet of steep hillside.

This project was a great introduction to invasive species for the crews, who were able to work alongside representatives from the Syracuse City Parks Department, SUNY ESF, the Syracuse Parks Conservancy, and other organizations. Crews learned about the history of the park, how to identify and remove buckthorn, and how to properly handle various tools.

The project culminated in a work day with 100 youth and young adults from PEACE, as well as a visit from State Assemblyman Bill Magnarelli and meet and greet with Mayor Ben Walsh and County Legislator Peggy Chase. Several youth crew members were also filmed and interviewed by news outlets reporting on the project.

Everyone also had a chance to interact with critters including snakes, toads, and dragonflies. 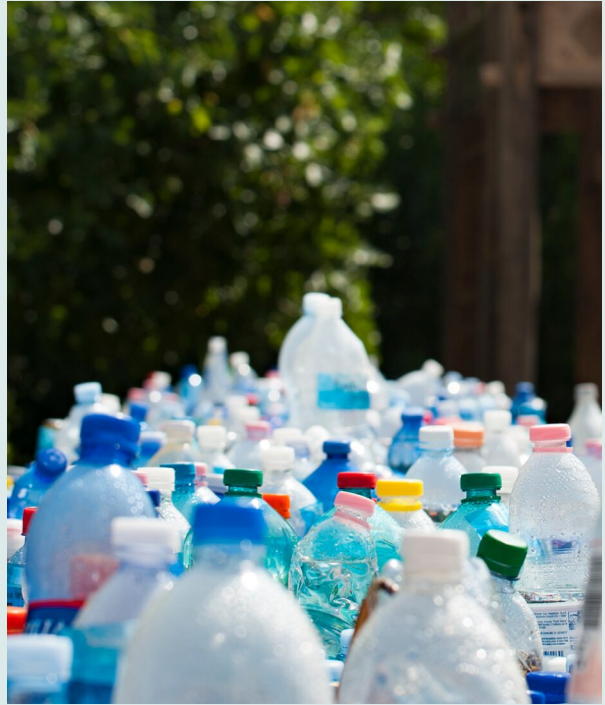
